# New Ending for the Book of Esther

aman returned to the royal palace for Queen Esther's second banquet. Once again, the king asked, "What is it you desire, Esther? Why have you invited us here? Speak and it shall be done!"

This time, Esther spoke. "Spare my life," she cried, "and the lives of my people. We have been sentenced to death!"

"Death? Your people? By whom?" asked the surprised king.

"By an evil, wicked man—by your minister Haman!"

The king was so shocked that he marched out of the room to regain his composure. Haman was trembling and fearful and threw himself at Queen Esther's feet to beg for mercy. When the king returned, he was furious, and he pointed at Haman and shouted, "Take him away and hang him! He will be killed, but no Jews will be killed."

Queen Esther said, "No my king, I do not think that is the answer."

"Ok, I'll listen," said the king, "What is your desire for this wicked man?

Esther took a deep breath and faced Haman. "First of all, you are being fired from your job as advisor to the king. That position of honor is one that you do not deserve, and it will now belong to my dear Uncle Mordechai." Esther looked towards the king for approval and he nodded. "But that is not all," she continued. "Haman, you are ordered to apologize publicly to all of the Jews of Shushan, and make sure that they know that their lives are not in any danger." Haman bowed his head in disgust, but

agreed to this consequence.

"That's still not all," said Esther. "Your new job is to be the minister to my dear Uncle Mordechai, and your wife Zeresh and ten wicked sons will also work for the kingdom. Every year, you will be responsible for doing 613 community service hours in Shushan. You will pick up garbage from the street, you will take care of ani-

mals, you will follow the mitzvot in the Torah, and you will learn basic human values of honesty, loyalty, compassion, and commitment. In return for your hard work, we will give you and your family a place to live in the palace, and food to eat. It will be difficult to complete your community service hours each year and do what is required for your job, so we have one final invitation for you."

The king, Haman, and Mordechai all looked towards the queen with a puzzled look in their faces. "Every year, on the 13th of Adar," she spoke, "you and your family will be invited to participate in the holiday of Purim with the rest of the Jewish community of Shushan. For that day, you should celebrate with us, and do no formal work. It is a holiday where we celebrate life and allow ourselves to be silly, and we want you to be a part of it too."

Queen Esther, King Achashveros, Mordechai, and Haman all agreed to the consequences that Esther outlined. They hoped that in time, these consequences would help Haman and his family understand their former wicked ways and they would become better and more understanding people.

Teacher's Note: After learning that the megillah tells us that Haman is killed at the end of the story, we decided that we didn't like the ending. Why should we kill Haman when we didn't want him to kill us? We didn't think that answer was in line with our Jewish values. In response, we wrote this.
