Letter from the president

I chatted with Uncle Moshe on the phone the other evening. He was telling me that he and his best friend Sy Gold, who he grew up with on Jerome Ave in the Bronx, were reminiscing about past Passovers they had spent together. Like the times they would eat matzah sandwiches while sitting in the bleachers at Yankee Stadium while their friend Tony Mascelli was eating ballpark hotdogs like they were going out of style. He said one time he and Sy were sitting on a park bench in Van Cortland Park eating their Passover lunches when a blind man came along and sat down on their bench. Unc and Sy looked at each other. Sy shrugged and passed the blind man a sheet of matzah. Uncle Moishe and Sy watched the man for a few minutes handle the matzah and then with a puzzled look the man exclaimed, "Who wrote this drek!"

When I was a kid Passover was all about finding the Afikoman, the mystery of opening the door for Elijah to come in and playing with my cousins. Of course we all knew the Passover story of the Exodus from Eqypt that we had learned in Sunday school but to a kid growing up in the south Bronx it all seemed like ancient history.

Of course as I grew older I came to understand that the festival of Passover, often referred to as the "Season of our freedom," which alludes to more than just the Jew's freedom from enslavement in Egypt thousands of years ago. It invokes the true freedom of each and every Jew throughout time ever after the Exodus. When we thank G-d for the miracles of Passover we thank Him for bringing US, not them, up out of bondage, out of slavery in Egypt. We have a connection to those Jews, they were us and we are them.

If we subscribe to the Jewish doctrine of Tikkun Olam - "repairing the world" and making it a better place- then we need to take the thought of "they were us and we are them" a step further and extend it to all peoples that yearn for religious, spiritual, emotional and physical freedom as a fundamental human right of existence. We are all human beings. They are us and we are them as well. As Jews, we know better than most what it is like to suffer under repressive and murderous regimes. And so we as Jews should react to what is going on in Egypt and in Libya and Yemen not with fear but with empathy and support for fellow human beings struggling for their fundamental right of freedom.

So, this Passover, we have a rare opportunity. We have the chance to teach our children a living history lesson and bring the Exodus, the story of Passover to life in this modern day. We can discuss with our children the similarities of Passover and what is going on in northern Africa today. We can show them, first-hand, what it must have been like to gain freedom from a cruel and repressive Pharaoh, like Mubarak. They can see just how precious freedom is, that people will risk their lives against great odds to achieve it as they are in Libya. We can help them understand the deeper meaning of Passover and why we celebrate it. It says in the Haggadah, "Each person is obliged to see himself as if he actually came out of Egypt." We can teach our children that this relates to not only Jews but to all peoples.
