Rabbi Comins shares a unique interpretation based on his experience of hiking the Sinai as an Israeli desert guide. All are welcome.

We'll take an in-depth look into the ancient Israelites' attitudes towards the natural world. Does Judaism posit an adversarial stance towards the natural world, as in the famous quote from Genesis 1 "conquer the earth and subdue it," or a harmonious approach to the earth that gives us life?
