Letter from the president

I talked to Uncle Moishe on the phone a couple of days ago and he was telling me about his experience on jury duty. (He actually got picked to sit on a jury.) So, the first witness up was an elderly gentleman. The attorney asked Mr. Goldman how old he was, to which Mr. Goldman replied, "I am, kin ahora, 82." The attorney asked, "What did you say?" "I said, I am, kin ahora, 82 years old." The judge, seeing the attorney's frustration, then intervened and said to Mr. Goldman, "If you don't want to be held in contempt of court please give a simple answer to the question, Mr. Goldman." Uncle Moishe, never having been in court before and not knowing the protocol, raises his hand and tentatively asks the judge, "Your Honor, may I ask the witness?" The judge looked in disbelief and consternation but nodded yes. So Unc gets up and says, "Nu, Mr. Goldman, kin ahora, how old are you sir?" Mr. Goldman replied, "82".

What is the cost of being Jewish today? In his sermon at the July Shabbous service Rabbi Andy Feig referred to some research that it costs a family between \$60,000 and \$120,000 to be observant. This includes kosher food, membership to a shul, Hebrew school for the kids, summer camp, etc. It adds up, no? And what does it cost to be Jewish in Jackson Hole? If you would consider for a moment that the Jackson Hole Jewish Community is one big extended family, then I would say it costs us closer to the \$120,000 (if not more) to be "Jackson Hole style" observant. Last fiscal year our expenses were \$126,000 and our revenue was \$107,000, a deficit of \$19,000. The federal government may be able to function like that, they can print money, but no family or organization can operate at a deficit, at least not for very long.

The reason I bring this up is that the JHJC Board has recently been wrestling with the budget for this new fiscal year. The dilemma is how can we continue to offer all the various programming, maintain a high level of quality content and still be affordable to the community. For instance, take the upcoming High Holidays. Do we sell tickets or do we not sell tickets? That has been the question. Even with cutting costs by doing potlucks, using volunteers to set-up and clean-up, having the Rabbi stay in congregants' homes instead of a hotel, having her use a donated car instead of a rental, we still estimate that the High Holidays will cost approximately \$12,500. And yet the Board decided that instead of selling tickets to offset costs, they would not sell tickets so that no one should feel that they can't come to services at this most important and special time of year for all Jews. Likewise, the Board has decided, in part because of the economy, to not consider raising fees for membership dues or for Bet Sefer. Are these good business practices, to not raise revenues in the face of deficits, probably not. However, while the Board feels strongly to its obligation to be fiscally responsible, it also strongly feels its responsibility to make religious observance, Jewish education and Jewish culture in the valley available to evervone.

So, what to do? With the economy still limping along and the prospects of fewer donations then in the past, and perhaps fewer folks becoming members due to the state of the economy, the Board is setting a lower, more conservative target budget for this fiscal year. There may be fewer Rabbi visits and more community-led services,

















