

## Letter from the president



When I talked to Uncle Moishe on Sunday after Thanksgiving he relayed a story to me he heard from his friend Reuben at the oneg in Shul on Shabbous. On Black Friday Reuben's wife Golda had dragged him

along shopping with her. They were in the ladies department at Lane Bryant for 45 minutes as Golda tried on outfit after outfit. Reuben was getting tired and irritable when Golda came out of the changing room for the 7th time wearing yet another outfit. Reuben told Unc that he looked her up and down and said, "OK Darling, that's the one. Not only does the outfit fit you perfectly but it is your favorite color, too. So, buy it and let's go get something to eat." To which Golda shouted at him, "Reuben, you schlemiel. This is the outfit I wore when we came in here!" Unc said he laughed so hard he almost choked on his pickled herring.

Four or five years ago a tourist called the office to see if we could gather a min-yan so he could say Kaddish for his father, who's Yarzeit it was. Unfortunately, we could not muster 10 men on such short notice for this ritual and so his opportunity to say Kaddish went unanswered as he was strictly observant. I was very upset by this at the time and still smart from it.

The word minyan means to count or number. Jewish law requires ten Jewish adults to be present for certain religious rituals and prayers. In more Orthodox congregations a minyan needs to be made up of ten men. In less Orthodox congregations minyans consist of men and women.

Some of the rituals and prayers that require a minyan are reciting Kaddish, Barechu, Kedusha and reading from the Torah. In a pinch, if there are nine people present the Torah can be counted as the tenth. In fact. we once did just that for a Saturday morning Shabbous service with Rabbi Mike Comins.

In large congregations gathering a minyan is usually not an issue. However, in small communities like ours, it often is. Especially if fulfilling that requirement in order to conduct certain rituals and prayers is important to some members of the congregation. I think the importance of observing the minyan requirement goes a lot deeper then being just a law to follow. The minyan reminds us that we are responsible for each other. It helps us to create a sense of community. It does not compel JHJC members to attend services for personal reasons but to consider attending services to be counted among the ten to enable others to pray.

Think about the times here in Jackson or elsewhere when you thought about skipping a service because it was inconvenient or you thought you had something better to do but then decided to come and were the one that made the minyan. Think about the times when you saw someone else walk into the service to create the minyan so you could recite Kaddish for a loved one and feel strengthened by those around you. Being available to create a minyan is the promise we make to each other to help uphold our Jewish traditions.

Whether you are spending the holiday season here or there have a Happy Chanukah filled with the light and warmth of family and friends.

## **Hebrew Classes Begin in January**

#### **Hebrew: Experiencing Sabbath Prayers**

Having trouble following along with the Hebrew prayers during services? Wish you could read those prayers during Shabbat like that guy next to you? This class will teach you how to read and understand the Sabbath prayers in Hebrew and how to have your own Shabbat service in your own home without a rabbi. Instructor, Daniel Haber will teach you basic understanding of important words and phrases, letters and vowels. No prior knowledge of Hebrew necessary. Does not cover modern conversational Hebrew.

#### **Intro to Conversational Hebrew**

When you're done with the course you'll be able to have simple conversations, know the aleph bet, and read and write basic letters, vowels and construct simple sentences. ALL FAITHS WELCOME. Does not cover intermediate/advanced Hebrew grammar.
