Letter from the President

So many people are excited and hopeful that anything is possible now that Barack Obama, the first black man ever to do so, has been elected President of the United States. I was daydreaming, just the other day, about what it would be like to have a Jew elected President. I can picture it. He calls his mother with the exciting news, "Mama, I've won the election! You've got to come to the swearing-in ceremony". His mother replies, "I don't know, what will I wear?" The son answers, "Don't worry, I'll send a dressmaker". "But I only eat Kosher food". "Mama, I'm going to be the President, I can get you Kosher food". "But how will I get there?". "I'll send a limo, just come Mama, please". "Ok, Ok, if it makes you happy, I'll come". The great day arrives and Mama is seated between the Justices of the Supreme Court and her son's new cabinet. Just last month we lit the candles of Chanukah. We should take the light of the Menorah into this new year and let it's warm glow be a glimmering symbol of hope for a brighter future.

PAPER CLIPS is the moving and inspiring documentary film that captures how students from rural Tennessee responded to lessons about the Holocaust-with a promise to honor every lost soul by collecting one paper clip for each individual exterminated by the Nazis. Despite the fact that they had previously been unaware of and unfamiliar with the Holocaust, their dedication was absolute. Their plan was simple but profound. The amazing result, a memorial railcar filled with 11 million paper clips (representing 6 million Jews and 5 million gypsies, homosexuals and other victims of the Holocaust) that stands permanently in their schoolyard, is an unforgettable lesson of how a committed group of children and educators can change the world one classroom at a time. Written by Joe Fab, Directed by Elliot Berlin and Joe Fab

Joe will also be conducting workshops with 6th-9th graders in Jackson on February 12 & 13. The focus of their workshops will be on lessons of tolerance, humanity, respect, diversity and expression as shown in the film; helping young people discover their own power and their own passions, and generating action around their concerns.

Images of the Nazi book burnings continue to resonate in American political discourse and infuse literature, film, and popular culture.
