Bits from our members

The Roots of the Jackson Hole Jewish Community

Local artist Laurie Thal, a Jackson resident since 1976, began having Chanukah parties in 1983. When guests could no longer squeeze into her Wilson cabin, the party moved to physician Brent Blue's home. Nonsectarian and the place to be for a decade, the annual Chanukah party was where Jewish Jackson Hole residents discovered each other, then began celebrating other Jewish holidays together at whatever home was offered, with services often led by no one in particular. Break-the-fast was held at Oxbow while the elk bugled. It was at a Sukkot party in 1996 that celebrants recognized that the time had come for more formal and extensive planning.

Laurie's brother, Larry Thal, organized a meeting that led to the formation of a nonprofit organization, the "Chaverim" (friends), now called the Jewish Community of Jackson Hole (JCJH). Their vision was to bond into a solid community that would celebrate holidays together and provide their children with a Jewish education. Then they worked together to make this vision a reality. Before long, Dan Fischel restored and donated a Torah. The

first baby naming was in 2000 and first Bat Mitzvah was in 2001.

Like so much else in the Hole, there is a unique flavor to Jewish life here. The JCJH currently holds monthly and holiday services in its own individual style. Sometimes, we are led by a Rabbi, sometimes a storyteller, and sometimes by a philosopher. Our Shabbats offer an opportunity to meet others and become part of the community, as well as an opportunity for those who are passing through to feel at home. We have weekly Bet Sefer classes, a two-week summer camp and adult education classes. While we lack a permanent home of our own, we meet outdoors in the summer, and in a beautiful log church in the winter. We have not yet affiliated, but lean toward the Reform, and have a decidedly informal and inclusive flavor. It's not so much your background or your outfit that matters, but rather your sense of family and community, and your desire to experience spirituality.

Jackson Hole is the most beautiful place on earth, a place where people are warm and friendly and welcoming, and we add a bit of Yiddishkeit to the mix.

Here are a few reviews of films I saw at this year's **Jackson Hole Film Festival** in early June.

Who has the right to forgive a monster? *Forgiving Dr. Mengele* poses this question as we follow a Holocaust survivor with a dauntless

spirit. She decides to forgive Mengele publicly even though as a child she and her identical twin were submitted to experiments that ultimately caused her sister to die at an early age. This film relates a particularly horrendous chapter of Nazi history--Mengele's experiments on identical twins, but

rises above personal history to present universal dilemmas: Who has the right to forgive? Is it possible to forgive and not to forget? Will forgiveness release us from the burden of pain caused by others?

Can enemies reconcile and live in peace together? Whiteflag - Playing with the Enemy introduces Israelis and Palestinians, who compose, write songs and perform together against all odds and obstacles—including torture. Emotional, troubling and thought provoking, this film leads us to consider how the world would be if adversaries could find common ground. These brave people have moved beyond performing together to take risks for and protect the enemies they have befriended and have come to love. The meld of Israeli and Palestinian music is breath-taking.

All of the films I saw were complex and had a passionate moral component which I could easily view from our teachings and beliefs. Among the most provocative are *Black Gold*, *Last Best Hope*, the World According to Sesame Street, Call to Return: The Oxycontin Story, Thin, Red State, Stephanie Daley, Aurora Borealis, Mrs. Palfrey at the Claremont, and Shadow Boxing.
