

Letter from the president

My family and I went to Salt Lake City to try and escape the wet cold weather that usually accompanies Old West Days here in Jackson Hole. We should have driven even further south as Salt Lake was just as wet and cold. This spring perhaps Tucson would not have been too far south to go!

As we always do when we are in Salt Lake we visited the Jewish part of the cemetery where my parents are buried. This last visit happened to coincide with Memorial Day, which was especially appropriate given that my Dad was a WWII combat veteran who landed at Anzio and fought in Italy and northern Africa. The visit also came

close to the anniversary of when my Mother passed away. In Jewish tradition top of the headstone to show that someone has visited the gravesite and that a loved one is not forgotten. This custom might have come from Biblical times when there home and lives in the Bronx.

except, perhaps, for a cairn of rocks marking the grave. When you visited the grave you either re-piled the stones or added new ones to perpetuate the existence of the gravesite. So we placed stones upon my parents' monument which I had collected last summer from some of the mountain summits we had reached. Placing these particular stones was meaningful to me as my parents admired the beauty of the mountains after they moved out west but were past the time in life when they could reach the tops themselves.

On my Mother's Yahrzeit, which is Yiddish for "time of year", I will light a special candle at sunset that will burn for 24 hours. In our

tradition the candle's flame represents the human soul. And I know that to be true as the soft glow of the candle's light reminds me how my Mother's presence always added a glowing warmth and light to our home and lives in the

Jewish law requires saying the Mourner's Kaddish at least three times on the day of observance of a Yahrzeit. And, although it is only required to observe the Yahrzeit of a parent, sibling, spouse or child it is permissible to also observe the Yahrzeit of a grandparent, other family member or even a friend. Some Jews also observe the day by fasting, as well.


There are several purposes in performing any or all of these rites or customs. In the candle's flame represents the case of parents it is a mitzwe place a small stone on *human soul*. *And I know that* vah, according to the Torah, to honor your mother and to be true as the soft glow of father and by observing their the candle's light reminds me Yahrzeit you are honoring them in death as you did in life. Another purpose is to reflect on the life of a loved one who has passed on and learn valuable lessons from the life they led. A Yahrzeit

> observance is also a time to review our own lives and think about how we want to be remembered by our children and grandchildren after we are gone. And so here is a Jewish tradition that means to provide us with an opportunity to examine ourselves and change the way we live, if need be, so we may be remembered for the good we did in our lives and for the example we set for others by the way we



Long-time Bet Sefer principal leaves the Valley


Dear JHJC Friends and Members,
