

WEIDER'S WORDS Purim is Coming, Let Us Celebrate & Be Proud

As we conclude February, Jews around the world are focusing on the celebration of Purim during March. On Saturday evening March 3rd the sounds of the Megillat Esther will echo through Jewish communities all over the globe. In reading the

Megillah, and celebrating
Purim, we are reminded of several important Jewish themes and obligations, both personal and communal.

First off we are reminded that Anti-Semitism is still a hatred that has not vanished from


this earth. While we Jews in America are secure, world Jewry must still deal with the falsehoods and lies concerning the Jewish people, our Jewish religious practices, and the State of Israel. As such, it is incumbent upon us to learn basic Jewish history and religious belief so that when we are confronted with the distortions of Anti-Semitism, we are prepared to answer intelligently and coherently.

Secondly, Purim reminds us that we must work to strengthen our own Jewish community and to bridge the gaps that may divide or alienate some within our community. The Jews of Shushan averted Haman's plot against them by joining together to fight as a unified people. Only when everyone in the community (as led by Mordecai and Esther) fought back against those who would have killed the Jews, did

they succeed. Everyone was a part of this process and everyone in the community benefited in the end.

And lastly, Purim reminds us of our connection with our neighbors and with our overall world. We cannot sit idly and allow others to

> repair the world around us. This is our task and a personal mitzvah that each of us must fulfill. The Purim custom of "Shalach Manot", sending presents of food to our friends, neighbors, and those in need in our community, is a great example of the Jewish concern for oth-



So as Purim approaches, I hope that the Jackson Jewish community will have good reason to celebrate and to act on the concerns that Purim calls to our attention. Indeed, Purim can be the perfect opportunity to bring everyone together for action programs that will benefit the entire community.

I hope you will celebrate Purim with gusto and with joy, but with an eye on the underlying values of the holiday.
