

Letter from the president



I called my Uncle Moishe the other day to wish him kinahurah, a happy 86th birthday. Unc thanked me and told me about the party they threw for him in the Bella S. Abzug Hall of his

shul on Moshula Parkway in the Bronx. While sipping tea and eating a bissel cinnamon bobka his friend, Yussel, told him about his son Yehuda's recent experience. Yehuda and his wife, who were Orthodox, were expecting their first child. As it happened her water broke on Shabbous. Having no alternative Yehuda called the cab company to send over a cab right away. To minimize the Shabbous violation he asked the dispatcher to send a non-Jewish driver. When the young couple got in the cab they could hear the dispatcher asking the cabbie over the two-way radio if he had picked up those two anti-Semites yet.

This month we celebrate the holiday of Purim. I won't go into the whole Megillah here but I will say that Purim celebrates the deliverance of the Jews of Persia by Esther (ahhhh) and her cousin Mordecai after Haman (boooo!), second in command to King Ahasueros, planned to exterminate all the Jews in Persia. Esther, who was the Queen, risked her own life to successfully appeal to the King to have Haman's (boooo!) order nullified. The Jews then in turn, won a great victory

over Haman (boooo!) and his sons and their followers.

When we celebrate this holiday this month we will observe several traditions that may need some explanation to the uninformed Purim party attendee. For instance, the use of noisemakers called groggers is a symbolic act of erasing Haman's(boooo!) name whenever it is mentioned in the reading of the Megillah, the Book of Esther. In earlier times, Jews wrote the name of Haman (booooo!) on two stones and when his name was mentioned they would noisily knock and rub the stones together to erase his name. Sort of a Flintstonian precursor to our modern metal grogger. We also eat hamantaschen on Purim. Some traditions say these triangular shaped pastries are to remind us of the three cornered hat worn by Haman (boooo!). I like the explanation that these sweet, three cornered treats remind us of the three patriarchs of Judaism: Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. Seems more fitting, no? One may also notice some Purim celebrants dress up in costumes and masks. Although Jewish tradition does not normally condone masguerading it has become an accepted custom to increase the joyous nature of observing this festival.

On a less whimsical note, Purim is the story of the deliverance of a people that were on the brink of annihilation. This came to pass through the courageous actions of one person. In addition to celebrating might I also suggest that we contemplate how many examples there are throughout history where one person, through selfless, courageous acts and
