Last month, our children recited and sang a warm and lively Bet Sefer Shabbat with Judd leading and Phyllis Turtle there as backup. Thanks to Judd, the teachers of Bet Sefer, and the kids for a job well-done. Instead of a sermon, Phyllis showed us the Arc, Torah, and accoutrements that the kids made at Bet Sefer as a project to learn more about the Torah. All of this reading and singing and clapping made us hungry, and fortunately we had a more substantial Oneg than usual. Thanks to all the parents who hosted.

Our Community Seder was a huge success. We had about 75 people in the Grand Room of Snow King. Mike led, using our new Hagaddahs. And we all played our parts as slaves and asked scholarly questions. The kids were great again—asking the four questions, reading some parts of the Seder service and searching for the Afakoman with real zeal. Mike redeemed the matzo with a silver dollar for each child and they made sure that everyone there got a piece of afkoman for “dessert.” We wish to thank Janna Rankin for suggesting the new Hagaddahs.

Dan Gordon will be here on May 19 to help Bet Sefer celebrate the last day of school with a picnic, stories, and songs. He will spend the weekend with us, leading the Shabbat service and teaching. Dave Freudenthal, like most of the other governors, has proclaimed May 1-8, Days of Remembrance, a time to remember the Holocaust and the lessons it can teach us about hate and intolerance. The request for the proclamation came from the JHJC at the behest of the United States Holocaust Museum in Washington, D.C.

Mayor Mike Baron also proclaimed these days at the request of Karin McQuillan and Patty Atkins of the Christian Center, a great friend of the Jewish People and of Israel. You can read both of these proclamations at our web site.

Sorry to report that of all the churches in town that were offered a Holocaust film to share with their congregations, only three, the Christian Center, the LDS Church, and St. John's, requested films. Sad and eye-opening because the films we offered are about the courageous acts of Righteous Gentiles.

Better news: We have given several films to the Middle School and the High School that they want to use in teaching their “World War II” and “Courage in Crisis” curriculums and to keep in their libraries for further use.

I hope to see you all at a showing of two fine short films on the Holocaust, sponsored by JHJC, at the library on Thursday, May 26 at 7 p.m., with a discussion to follow.

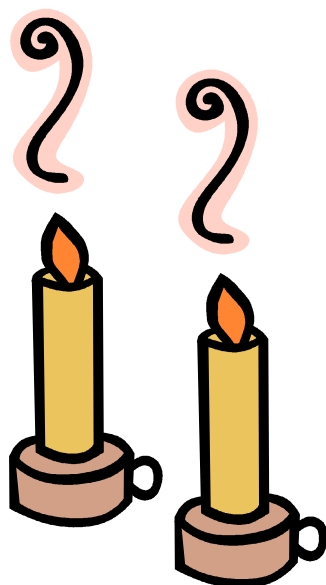

JHJC Outreach

In accepting donations and matching funds through Old Bill's Fun Run every year, the Jewish Community has a wonderful opportunity for outreach to our community, but also a bit of a dilemma. As a "Faith-based" organization, the Chaverim is limited to spending its Old Bill's fund on non-religious activities. Our Old Bill's applications have specified that we will spend the funds on building tolerance of diversity.

Thus, this year, our funds have been used to help fund non-religious aspects of our summer day camp, including scholarships for non-Jewish children, sponsoring our storytelling Rabbi in programs for the youth and elderly in our larger community, and most recently, the purchase of films on the Holocaust to help our community understand those events.

In future months, we hope to sponsor speakers, exhibits, cultural performances, and more in furtherance of our goal to build tolerance of diversity in our communities.

Rose's Brazilian Horoseth

This chorosis was the hit of last month's Seder. Rose is glad to share it with all.

3 medium apples, unpeeled, grated
1 3/4 cup chopped almonds, walnuts, or cashews
1 cup raisins
1/2 cup dates, pitted
1/4 tsp cinnamon
About 3/4 cup sweet Passover wine
1-2 tbs sugar, optional



Place all ingredients except wine and sugar in food processor or large bowl. Pulse or chop until well blended, adding only the amount of wine the fruits and nuts can absorb. Place in large bowl and taste, adding sugar if needed.

Yield, 5 cups.

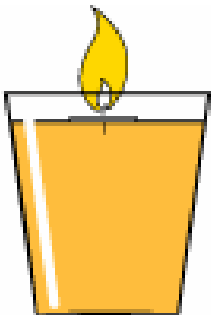
