Letter from the president

Uncle Moishe was telling me that he was visiting his wife's sister, Rivka, who was in Mt. Sinai Hospital for a procedure. She was sharing the room with another woman. Unc couldn't help but overhear the conversation this woman was having on the phone. "Hello, Mt. Sinai Hospital? Look dalink, I'd like to talk to the person who gives the information about the patients. I want all the information from top to bottom, from A to Z." The line is silent for a moment and then she hears, "Are you the lady who is calling about one of the patients?" "Yes, dalink, I'd like to know all the information about Sarah Finkel in room 302." He says, "Finkel, Finkel. Let me see, Feinberg, Farber, ah Finkel. Oh yes, Mrs. Finkel is doing fine. Her blood pressure is down, her tests were negative and her doctor writes that he is going to send her home on Tuesday at noon." "Tanks to G-d. That's vonderful. You say she is going home at noon on Tuesday. I'm so happy to hear that. That's vonderful news!" The man on the line says, "From your enthusiasm I take it you must be a close relative of Mrs. Finkel?" To this she exclaims, "Vot close relative. I'm Sarah Finkel. My doctor don't tell me from nothing!"

My wife just got back from a trip overseas to Italy. And yes, she did get caught up in the chaos caused by the volcanic ash from Iceland. In fact, she had to stay an extra week. And while it was simply an annoyance for some, there was a lot of real hardship for many people. This event set me to thinking, which I rarely do, about how powerless we seem in the face of natural occurrences despite all our technology. I then did some "net surfing", which I do even more infrequently than thinking, to see what might be said on the subject. Judaism posits that the natural world, as created by G-d, was given to man to have dominion over, but only so far as defined by natural and religious laws. The natural laws being those of physics and the ethical laws being those of Judaism, such as a prohibition against needless waste and destruction of natural resources, tempering our manipulation of what G-d created. He gave us free choice, but he also gave us a set of moral and ethical laws to guide us to perfect the world. not destroy it. All our advances in technology have not been able to insulate us from disasters and the accompanying human suffering as a result of natural events such as earthquakes, tsunamis and floods. So it begs the question, if G-d created the world for us to have dominion over why did He not give us control over the powers of nature, as well? Why does He allow such tragedies resulting from these natural phenomena to happen to people? These questions have been asked for centuries and most likely will never be answered. In Jewish tradition, though, we don't even entertain these questions. The more important question to us is not why G-d allows them to happen but how does G-d want us

May Shabbat

Visiting Rabbi Arinna Moon Shelby • May 14, 2010

Rabbi Arinna Shelby works in Los Angeles as a hospice chaplain providing spiritual care for patients and their families at the end of life. For the past two years, she was the rabbi at Mt. Sinai Congregation in Cheyenne where she was not only the first woman rabbi at the synagogue, but the first woman rabbi to hold a pulpit in the state of Wyoming. While in Cheyenne, she spearheaded an increase in synagogue programming as well as coordinating outreach with the larger community. She headed the first rabbinic bet din in Wyoming to sanction conversions.

Prior to becoming a rabbi she worked in Seattle in the fields of health-care and social services, first as a psychotherapist and then as a social service administrator. She founded the award-winning Partners in Caring program which serves elderly and disabled adults in public housing, and presented the program at the American Society on Aging National Conference and the First International Conference on Home Care held in Jerusalem, Israel. Rabbi Shelby was part of the core team of women who organized the First International Conference on Judaism, Feminism and Psychology held in 1992. From that experience, she co-edited the book Jewish Women Speak Out: Expanding the Boundaries of Psychology which won the National Distinguished Publication Award from the Association for Women in Psychology.

Rabbi Shelby received her Master's degree in Psychology from Antioch University Seattle in 1986 and her Rabbinic ordination from The Academy for Jewish Religion California in 2008. She is a member of the Board of Rabbis of Southern California and a member of the Sandra Caplan Community Bet Din of Southern California. She currently resides in Redondo Beach, California with her husband, Andy.


