Letter from the president

Uncle Moishe decided to give me a Yiddish lesson on the phone. He was playing canasta with his buddies at the senior center on Moshula Parkway and an argument ensued about the difference between a schlomozel and a schlemiel. Unc's friend Murray settled the argument by explaining that a schlomozel is a guy that walks by a second story window ledge and knocks the flower pot off and a schlemeil is the guy walking by on the sidewalk below.

We had a wonderful second night Passover seder at the Old Wilson Schoolhouse. Once again Wendell Stam catered a very delicious seder meal served by his hard-working staff. What I always find so impressive about JHJC members is that they don't just show up for an event expecting everything to be done for them. They really take ownership of the events they put on and the seder was a perfect example of this as so many people volunteered to make it happen. Boiling dozens of eggs, finding and preparing shankbones, putting together seder plates, baking Kp desserts, setting up tables, doing our due diligence as Jews on Passover by many taking turns reading portions of the Haggadah and satisfying our obligations to remember where we came from and how we got here as a free people, cleaning up after the seder, the list goes on and on. Something that really struck me this year was the number of young families that attended the seder. We had so many kids that Audrey set up a "Romper Room" in one corner of the schoolhouse complete with crayons and large pieces of blank paper to draw on. It made me think back to when I was a kid going to my Grandma Sylvie's on Fox St. in the Bronx for the family seder. Warm memories that my family created for me and my brother and cousins just like the memories these young kids will hopefully have of these seders. And so this is how it goes. Our traditions passed on from generation to generation through the lovely memories we create for our children so that they may one day do the same for their kids . I think it bodes well for the future of our Jewish community that so many young families with children are coming to

events such as this one, doing their part to keep the circle unbroken.

The Board was recently reviewing the results of the survey it had put out to the congregation this past winter. After looking at some of the feedback I don't know what the Board was thinking when it decided to survey this eclectic group of Jews. Of course, everyone knows the old joke about having three Jews in a room with four opinions. Well that about sums up comments made in the survey. "Build our own Temple", Don't build a Temple". "Hire a Rabbi", "Don't hire a Rabbi". "Bothered by services in a church", "Not bothered by holding services in a church". You get the idea. One thing everyone seemed to agree on is that having a study group when we have a visiting Rabbi on a fresh powder Sunday will not attract very many folks. All kidding aside, we had a very good response from the membership. Observances of Jewish holidays, Bet Sefer and Shabbous services ranked at the top of importance out of 15 items. We may have put the great debate over tickets/no tickets for High Holidays to rest as the majority of respondents said no to tickets. The Community overwhelmingly thought that day camp and Bet Sefer enriched their kids and met their needs. Surprisingly, by two to one members thought that formal Rabbinical leadership at Shabbous services wasn't that critical and were very comfortable with lay leadership. Most all respondents indicated that one Shabbous service per month met their needs for frequency. Most additional comments were positive overall and several excerpted comments seem to sum it up best, "We are a diverse Jewish community ... " Like some members I am culturally Jewish but not religious ... ", and "I think the Jewish community is doing a great job in a challenging environment ... ". Isaac Babel is one of the great Jewish-Russian writers of the 20th century. He honed his art during the Communist revolution and the civil war that followed, as a journalist and writer of short fiction. He was an active participant in the vibrant Russian literary world of the early twenties. Like many of his contemporaries, he gradually grew silent as Stalin consolidated his control of the arts, and was eventually arrested and sent into the world of the transit

and labor camps, where he perished. His art, however, survived and remains compelling to this day. Refreshments served.
