Taste of NYC comes to JH

New York transplants can breath a sigh of relief: a New York style deli, Kashman's Place, is coming soon to Jackson Hole.

Managing partner Eben Dorros said the new deli, which also exists in two locations in Scottsdale, Ariz.,

will occupy the old Betty Rock space on Pearl Avenue and should be open this fall.

Kashman's Place will serve New York-style deli sandwiches, salads and soups. And of course there will be an espresso bar serving Seattle Best coffee. In addition to lunch, Dorros promised Kashman's will offer a killer all-day breakfast staring at 6 a.m. Breakfast lovers will find omelets, waffles, pancakes, toasted bagels and fruit salads on the menu.

By "bagles," Dorros said, he means boiled and baked fresh and on-site.

"The water really makes the bagel," said Dorros. "We've tested this filtration system in our other two stores and we get that light consistency bagel – the way a bagel should be."

Of the Scottsdale locations, the Phoenix New Times wrote, "This isn't your typical Jewish deli." Call 733-5600.
