# Letter from the president

I talked to Uncle Moishe on the phone yesterday. He was asking how Rosh HaShannah services went and especially what Rebbe Carl Levenson had to say. He's a big fan of Carl's and always fascinated by Carl's comments and perspectives on Judaism even though I am giving Unc a poor layman's translation. He also said he had visited with his dear friend, Solomon Rosen, who was up from Boca to be with family in the Bronx during the High Holidays. They were sitting on the stoop one day and of course the conversation got around to health issues. Unc said the conversation went something like this. "Nu, Solly, how's by you?" "Oy, Moishe, I've gotten so old. I've had two by-passes, a hip replacement and a new knee. I got the diabetes. I'm half blind and I can't hear anything quieter than a jet engine. I can't remember if I'm 88 or 92. I can hardly feel my hands or feet mit the bad circulation. But Moishe, I tell you, Tanks to G-d, I still have my Florida driver's license."

According to Jewish law when a child reaches the age of thirteen they are perceived to be able to take responsibility for their own actions. That is to say, at that age, they are thought of as being able to think and act morally and ethically. From a religious perspective it is assumed that at this time, they can follow the commandments in the Torah on their own. The phrase Bar Mitzvah literally translates as "son of commandment." The term Bar Mitzvah first appears in the Talmud early in the "Common Era." It refers to a person who is subject to following the commandments of the Torah. In addition to these responsibili-

ties they can now be counted toward a minyon and may lead prayer services, as well. Ancient Jewish tradition says they may even be legally married. Don't get any ideas, Esther!

By Jewish custom once a child reaches the age of thirteen they automatically assume the role of a Bar Mitzvah with all it's intendent responsibilities in the Jewish community. There does not have to be a ceremony or rite of passage of any sort. However, in modern American society it has become tradition for families and Jewish communities to acknowledge this milepost in a child's life with some sort of celebration and ritual observance. Some of the common aspects of the ritual ceremony are reading a Torah portion at a Shabbous morning service or at another morning service when the Torah is traditionally read, reciting a Haftorah, which is a section from the books of the Prophets and preparing and offering a D'var Torah which are comments on the meaning of the Torah portion.

The reason I offer this encapsulated information on B'nai Mitzvahs (plural for Bat/Bas Mitzvah) is that in the next eighteen months to two years we have the potential to have 4 or 5 B'nai Mitzvahs in our community. It has been a topic of conversation at the JHJC Board of Directors meetings as to what the JHJC's role should and can be in the process and what resources we can offer to families with children approaching the magic age. Some of the traditional requirements leading up to the B'nai Mitzvah are attending Hebrew school to learn both Hebrew and basic Jewish customs and concepts, attending a number of
