## Letter from the president

Uncle Moishe called just the other day to tell me he was back in the Bronx after spending a month escaping the city heat in the Catskills at Al and Lena's bungalow colony near Monticello. Unc and my Aunt were having Shabbos dinner one night with a couple they had met at the pool. They were having brisket and it reminded their new friend Esther of a time when she was a young mother making brisket for Shabbos dinner. It was a custom that she would cut the ends off the brisket before putting it in the roasting pan. Her curious 7 year old daughter asked her why she did it. Esther said she didn't know why but that was what her mother and grandmother had always done and suggested they call grandma and ask her why. So, Esther called her mother and asked why she always cut the ends off of the brisket. Well she was surprised when her mother didn't know the reason either but suggested they visit great-grandma in the nursing home and ask her. Thinking there was a sacred family tradition or religious reason of some sort for cutting the ends off the Shabbos brisket they asked 90 year old great-grandma why they all did this generation after generation. Great grandma Rivka told them, with a twinkle in her eye, "I don't know why you do it, but I never had a pan that was large enough."

If there is forest fire smoke in the valley it must be late August. And if it is late August it won't be long before there is snow appearing on the mountain peaks. Summer vacation is ending for our kids. The days are getting shorter putting an end to those evening river floats or long bike rides after a day's work. The Saturday morning ritual of stopping by the Farmer's Market for a tasty home grown treat will be coming to an end as well. It does seem that with the changing of the seasons many wonderful things are coming to

an end. However, we can also look forward to beginnings, too. The High Holidays, Rosh Hashannah and Yom Kippur, offer us, among other things, the opportunity to make changes in our lives for the better. To start afresh as it were in some aspect of our life that we feel needs improvement. The idea that Rosh Hashannah signifies the Jewish new year symbolizes the possibility of re-inventing oneself in a positive way through reflection, introspection, repentance, good deeds and reconciliation. It is G-d's way of allowing us to adjust the course of our lives. So, don't dread the end of those long, sunny, endless summer days. His insights into Judaism given in his dynamic style are always thought provoking and are a favorite part of the service for me.

So I look forward to seeing you all at High Holiday services and for those of our friends observing the holidays elsewhere on Rosh Hashannah "L'Shana Tova", For A Good Year and on Yom Kippur, "G'mar Hatimah Tova", that you be sealed for a good year .



### Carl Levenson

Carl Levenson has been leading services with the JHJC for many years. He has a Ph.D in Philosophy from the University of Chicago and a M.A. from University of Chicago Divinity School. He is currently a professor of philosophy at Idaho State University in Pocatello.

His approach to Judaism often includes philosophical and mystical themes. He says, "I believe in philosophy. With a little philosophy, you see more clearly and live more freely. Plato and Socrates are my favorite philosophers." He goes on to say, "I

participate actively in the religious life of our community and was for 15 years the religious leader of Temple Emanuel in Pocatello. But while I can practice only one religion, I certainly love all the great religions of the world."

He lives in Pocatello with his wife, Judith who studied theology and psychotherapy; she is now a therapist in Pocatello. He has two sons; Joshua, who spends much

of his time in Shanghai, and Adam, who is a student at Century High School.
